





## THE IMPORTANCE OF REPORTING FLOODING



#### Why should you report a flood?

If agencies are aware of the problem, they can respond to unblock gullies, close roads, and co-ordinate and prioritise recovery efforts.



At times of a flood, local authorities can provide skips, council tax relief and business rates rebates, as well as record eligibility for any recovery or resilience grants which may be available.



Early reporting helps agencies to deploy staff as soon as possible to document and record events, which can be greatly beneficial to any subsequent investigation.



Proactive reporting of floods and flood risk issues by communities can help to identify recurring issues and can influence maintenance schedules.



The greater the impact of a flood event, the easier it is for agencies to make a business case for alleviation works and flood defence schemes. Reporting incidents helps to capture the true economic cost of a flood and help attract funding.

# FLOOD RISK ASSETS - REPORTING ISSUES WHAT ARE FLOOD RISK ASSETS?

Flood risk assets are any structure or landscape feature which has a flood risk management function. They require maintenance to ensure they can continue to function effectively and may not necessarily be located close to a watercourse.

Flood risk assets can take many forms, including...



**Culverts** 



**Flood Gates** 



**Monitoring Station** 



Flood Defence Wall



**Embankment** 



Trash Screen

#### Issues which may need reporting can include...

- Blocked or broken trash screens on culverts
- Vehicle strikes to flood walls and flood gates
- Vandalism to water level monitoring stations
- Fly-tipping within water courses
- Blocked or collapsed drains
- Animal burrows within embankments can weaken the structure and lead to collapse
- Grass cuttings should not be deposited with ditches, dykes and other watercourses. Cuttings should always be raked out and removed from site.

If a damaged or failing flood risk asset is owned by a Risk Management Authority and accompanied by a plaque with contact details, you should report any defects directly to them. Alternatively, you can report issues with any flood risk asset through to your Lead Local Flood Authority.
